I also am starting to use words to communicate what I want, and to share when I see exciting things! I love to look at books and sing songs. - Evaluation & Assessment: offered to people of all ages to determine an initial diagnosis or confirm a previous diagnosis, identify additional conditions/disorders, assess level of functioning, and make appropriate recommendations for services.
- Pre-K Program: an intensive program for children ages 2-5 years old that improves communication, disruptive behaviors, self-regulation and social interaction.
- First Friends Program: a treatment program that is focused on improving socialization and communication, particularly with peers, for children up to 6 years old.
- Early Explorers Program: a program for children ages 2 to 4 years old that have recently received an autism diagnosis.
- Social Competency Program: an afterschool program designed to develop and facilitate social competency skills in children and adolescents ages 6 to 16 vears old.
- Outpatient Program: individualized one-on-one, family and group therapy for people of all ages.
- Saturday Program: a weekly program for teens and young adults that focuses on teaching pre-vocational and independent life skills.
- Consultation Services: customized workshops, seminars and training to those working with individuals with autism.

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Commonwealth Grants \$1 Million

The Center for Autism was pleased to announce this year that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania awarded a \$1 million Economic Initiative Grant (EIG) to help fund the expansion of its Northeast Philadelphia location at 2801 Grant Avenue. To honor this significant contribution, Governor Tom Corbett visited the Center for Autism on

December 15 to accept a certificate of appreciation, tour the facility and give children in the program holiday gifts. He also met with the Board of Directors and employees of the Center for Autism and viewed the renderings of the plan for expansion.

"The funds from the Commonwealth will have a significant impact on our ability to serve the growing number of individuals and families who need autism services in the Philadelphia community," said David M. Maola, Esg., Chief Executive Officer of the Center for Autism. "As we prepare to celebrate the Center's 60th anniversary in 2015. Governor Corbett's commitment to our organization's future further supports the vital role we have in helping people with Autism Spectrum Disorder."

The Center for Autism will use awarded EIG funds to renovate additional space in the facility, which will allow the organization to provide 350 more evaluations each year and serve 270 more individuals and families through its various treatment programs. The Economic Initiative Grant Program is administered by the Office of the Budget for the acquisition and construction of regional economic, cultural, civic, recreational, and historical improvement projects.



Financial Report July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015

The Center for Autism had another great year ending June 30, 2015. The Center had total support and revenue of \$14,984,977, compared to \$13,971,842 for the year ended June 30, 2014. The Center's largest expense item is personnel, which is directly related to our high therapist to client ratio within the treatment programs. Most of the Center's support and revenue is fee for service, in addition to grants, donations and fundraising events. The Center for Autism showed an increase in net assets of \$686,054 in 2015 versus an increase in net assets of \$624,254 in 2014. The Center also paid down approximately \$298,000 in bank loans.
